

You will need to access your SAR to save and upload to your Scholarship Application. There are 2 ways to access your SAR:

1) If you filed electronically and chose to receive your SAR via email, you should receive your SAR within a few days. The federal processor will send your SAR from the email address: cpsnotify@cpsemail.ed.gov. Keep an eye on your bulk or junk mail folders after you submit your FAFSA in case the email with your SAR gets routed there. (If you did not provide a valid e-mail address on your FAFSA, the Social Security Number you included in your FAFSA did not match the one on file for you with the Social Security Administration, or you did not sign your FAFSA, you will receive either a SAR or a SAR Acknowledgement via postal mail. Typically, you will be able to access your SAR within two weeks of filing your FAFSA.)

2) Any student with an [FSA ID](#) can view or print his/her SAR by clicking **Login** on the *FAFSA on the Web* home page <https://fafsa.ed.gov/> to log in, then selecting **View or Print your Student Aid Report (SAR)** from the “My FAFSA” page. You will have to download and save your SAR as a pdf to upload this document to your scholarship application in the appropriate place.

Definitions:

The Student Aid Report (SAR) is a paper or electronic document that gives you some basic information about your eligibility for federal student aid and lists your answers to the questions on your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Expected Family Contribution (EFC): Page 1, underneath the date near the top right of your SAR. The EFC is the amount the federal government believes that your family is able to contribute toward your college costs, based on the financial information provided. This is not necessarily the amount you will have to pay
